Many Rosedale businesses brought in boxes upon boxes of food they and their customers had collected throughout the fall. Police officers from the National Latino Peace Officers Association stopped in to give funds they had spent all year collecting. And dedicated volunteers counted, sorted, and assembled cans, coats, turkeys, fruit baskets, and more. Then, on November 21, 40 Rosedale elders and families received baskets overflowing with tur-

keys; fresh produce; kitchen staples like beans, rice, flour, and oil; household necessities: and winter weather gear for their children.

This is RDA's Feed-a-Family program. "Each year I'm nervous we won't have enough to give the families," savs Program Director Je T'aime Taylor, who has coordinated the program at RDA for four years. "And each year I'm again reminded of the great generosity of the Rosedale community. Individuals, businesses, churches, schools, and area organizations all come together to make sure neighbors' needs are met during the Thanksgiving season."

"Do you want to see my medal?" asks Theresa Ryes-Cummings, RDA board member. Wide-eyed, fourth grader Camila Orellana-Solis reaches out to grab hold of Theresa's 100K ultra marathon medal. Though generations apart, both women are from Wyandotte County and both also recently won medals for races they ran. Camila Orellana, a nine year old student at Frank Rushton Elementary placed first in her age group at the Overrun 5K race for Ovarian cancer. Likewise, Theresa Ryes-Cummings placed second out of all women participants in a 100K ultra marathon. So last month I walked down Memory Lane with these two neighborhood leaders and recorded their conversation about their accomplishments and why they enjoy running.

"What do you love about running?" Theresa asks Camila. Smiling up at Theresa, Camila answers, "It's good for exercise, for my heart, for fun, and I like running with family." Nodding, Theresa says, "I agree it's great for exercise. I love to run in the woods out in nature. I just run for hours and hours in the woods and I feel like I become part of nature." Jumping in, I ask Camila. "How did you feel when you found out you won first place in your age group?" She

ponders the question; then with a huge grin, responds, "I felt proud of myself!" Turning to Theresa, I ask how she felt when she realized she'd won second. "I was so surprised to learn I won second out of all the women!" she shared.

Leaning over the table, Theresa pulls out two gifts she has for Camila. One is a multipurpose scarf, the other a pair of high quality running toe socks. "These socks may be a little big for you right now, but save them. You can use them in high school when you run cross country." I ask them one last question.

"What's your personal mantra or running phrase that gives you motivation?" Both smile to themselves, then look at me ready to share the words that fuel their feet. "Mine is light legs, strong run," says Theresa. "Be confident, never give up, be fearless, girl power!" Camila tells me. Theresa and Camila give each other a big hug. Before parting ways, each encourages the other to continue the lifelong journey and joy of running.
