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

City adopts system for occupational tax determination

Kansas City, Kan., is adopting a new system for taxing wholesale, manufacturing, processing and retail businesses under the city's occupational tax ordinance.

In the past the annual occupational tax was based on a business's assessed valuation. But because of the new Kansas tax assessment process, inventory no longer is included in the assessed valuation of a business. Therefore, the assessed valuations of many businesses will decline substantially, city officials explained.

To avoid losing revenue, the city council last week decided to substitute a new system for computing the occupational tax of wholesalers, manufacturers, processors and retailers starting in January, 1990. The new system will use square footage of a business's premises in the city rather than assessed valuation when computing the ococcupational taxes on income or gross receip's.

nance was in 1986 when the council increased many of the tax rates for various classifications of businesses. The rates had not been raised since World War II.

Under the new ordinance, all manufacturers, wholesalers and processors shall pay an occupational tax based on the number of total interior square feet occupied by the business without regard to use; plus one-half of the number of square feet of any exterior sales or display areas open in whole or in part to the occupational tax is not general public without regard to specifically set out, shall pay an use. The annual tax to be paid annual tax of \$100.

based on square footage ranges from \$50 for 0 to 2,999 feet, to \$2,775 for 200,000 or more feet.

Under the new ordinance, all retailers and all persons engaged in other businesses with a fixed place of business located within the city shall pay an occupational tax based on the number of total interior square feet occupied by the business without regard to use, plus onehalf of the number of square feet of any exterior sales or display areas open in whole or in part to the general public without regard to use. Interior square feet in this provision includes the perimeter measurement of a structure, but does not include a basement. The annual tax based on the square footage runs from \$30 for 0 to 999 feet up to \$1,925 for 75,000 or more feet.

Not all businesses' occupational tax will be based on square footage under the new system. Some businesses, such as those providing services or entertainment of some kind, do not lend themselves to being cupational tax to be paid. Businesses at home are also taxed by the city. Under the new ordinance, if a person conducts a business in or from his home (and the business is classified under the ordinance) such person shall pay an annual tax of from \$30 to \$50, depending on its classification. All persons engaged in businesses that don't have a fixed place of business within the city, and for which an

WYANDOTTE COUNTY HOUSING COALITION SEEKS COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE

There are literally hundreds of low and fixed income homeowners living in homes with leaky roofs, throughout Kansas City, Kansas. Every social service agency in KCK that does housing repairs has received calls about leaky roots. There are two state-funded agencies operating in KCK that do nothing but weatherize the homes of low-income owners. They insulate walls and attics and fix doors and windows. But if they come into a home with a bad roof they cannot insulate the home until the roof is fixed. And they do not have the manpower or money to fix roofs.

Eight housing repair groups in KCK have been meeting as the Wyandotte County Housing Coalition, since the first of the year, to figure out ways to cooperate and do better work. The roofing problem represents a major concern.

Skilled volunteers are needed, by the pickup loads. Donated materials (or materials paid for by donations) are needed by the pickup loads. And a free storage space is needed to store the materials.

BUSINESS INCENTIVES AVAILABLE IN KANSAS CITY, KANSAS

Industrial Revenue Bond Financing & Tax Abatements-Industrial Revenue Bonds can finance up to 100% of the cost of land, buildings, machinery and equipment, as well as developmental and financing costs. Buildings, machinery and equipment can be pre-owned and in place. The cost of themoney is 2-3% lower than that of conventional financing due to the tax-exempt status. Repayment schedules can be structured to meet the recipient's cash flow requirements. A city tax abatement policy allows an effective 75% savings in property taxes.

Job Expansion & Investment Credit Act-The Job Expansion and investment Credit Act provides a credit against Kansas corporate income tax and is available for a ten-year perios with the amount of credit allowed each year equal to \$100 per new employee plus \$100 for each \$100,000 in capital investment.

Kansas Industrial Training Program-The Kansas Industrial Training Program is a flexible, statefunded, industrial training program which is tailor made for each manufacturing operation. Training can be combined on a pre-employment or on-the-job basis. Training can take place in the plant, vocational school, or other facility. Covered expenses include instructors wages, administrative costs, travel, training manuals and quides supplies, stock materials and certain utility expenses.
