Rosedale jewel in KCK's crown

Rosedale is that part of Kansas City, Kan., dominated by the monster — the University of Kansas Medical Center. Rosedale also is my favorite sector of KCK.

What would Rosedale be without the medical center? It would be a lot worse off, despite the heavy traffic and parking problems the monster produces.

The medical center brings people to Rosedale, about 10,000 of them everyday. Those people spend a lot of money around there, making Rosedale economically vibrant.

Rosedale, which used to be a separate municipality until merged into KCK in the early part of the century, is a mishmash of residential and business activity. That mishmash, including spot zoning, is both a positive and negative force in Rosedale with its many good eataries and bars.

I count that bunch of restaurants and bars on 39th Street just east of State Line as being part of Rosedale although that area is actually in K.C., Mo. That string of joints, starting with the venerable Jimmy's Jigger, has become a neat entertainment district with both high-priced and moderately priced enjoyment to be had.

The assets and liabilities of Rosedale were dissected last week at a town meeting sponsored by the Rosedale Development Association (RDA). The association has a new executive director, Wendy Wilson, who made a good splash on just her third day on the job replacing Lisa Gray who resigned recently after several years in the position.

Last year Lisa moved out of Rosedale, which displeased RDA members. Now enters Wendy, who lives in Rosedale and plans to stay.

Wendy wants to come up with a 5-year plan for Rosedale. Well, that's OK, except that 5-year plans usually fail because people don't take them seriously enough. But

Wendy seems sincere. She believes that close knit neighborhoods make for a good quality of living.

One problem in Rosedale, though, is that many transient type people live there. Many of them are medical center students and researchers. They are there for a year or two, then gone. Most of the temporary residents don't have a vested interest in Rosedale's future.

At the meeting crime was not considered a major problem in Rosedale compared with other sections of the city. Rosedalians are more concerned with lack of code enforcement by city hall.

Because of the medical center, property values in Rosedale are relatively strong. But the housing stock is getting older. Residents want stiffer code enforcement, especially on the abundance of rental housing which seems to be in the worse shape.

Some parts of Rosedale, particularly along Merriam Lane and Southwest Boulevard, need new curbs, sidewalks and better drainage, it was pointed out. Turkey Creek flooding over the years has hurt Rosedale. Curing that flooding is a top priority for Rosedalians.

KCK Fire Chief John Bergman has lived in Rosedale for 20 years. He lives on busy Rainbow Blvd. Bergman said he likes the central location of Rosedale which is close to major highways, downtown K.C., Mo., Johnson County and the Country Club Plaza.

Some folks at the meeting said they think many Rosedalians don't think of themselves as living in KCK. Rosedale seems kind of removed from the rest of the city. Maybe so, but all things considered, Rosedale is one of the more interesting areas of KCK.

Homeless Shelter to Serve Twice As Many

Over a year ago Casa Peregrino opened its doors at One Elmwood Ave. to serve area homeless. The charitable foundation will be expanding its shelter to house twice as many indigent persons. Initially the city council issued a special use permit allowing up to 30 persons a night to be housed at the shelter. On Dec. 30th foundation officals convinced the city council to extend the permit for five years and increase to 60 the number of persons housed per night at the site.

The foundation does not receive any federal, state or United Way funds. Renovation of the abandoned warehouse was accomplished with donated money, labor and materials. Donations from individuals and foundations serve to keep the doors open. Various groups, including KU, Sprint, area families and churches, volunteer to fix and serve evening meals.

A majority of the tenants are illegal aliens from Latin America. Many arrive by freight trains that pass through Rosedale. Upon arrival at the shelter they must abide by strict rules. No drugs, drunks or alcohol are allowed and each tenant must help with some of the chores.

Casa Peregrino helps in keeping indigents off the streets, out of abandoned buildings, where the fires they light to stay warm sometimes get out of control and away from criminal activity.





Rosedale Arch Master Plan Unveiling

The Rosedale Memorial Arch Ad-Hoc Committee is a volunteer gathering of residents, veterans, neighborhood organizations, city administrators, and interested citizens. Our function is to work together to beautify and improve the Rosedale Memorial Arch and surrounding Mount Marty Park so that it may contribute to the lives of all users.

This committee began as an expansion of the Rosedale Development Association Arch committee. The RDA Arch committee began examining potential improvements to the Arch and park. This committee consisted of Ray Pharis, Rick Silva, Myrna Corpeny, LaVone Daily, Harley Marshall and Tim Hamilton. The committee realized that in order to realistically promote changes, the committee needed the involvement of city government, the Board of Public Utilities, veterans groups, and other interested parties. Therefore, the RDA Arch committee decided to invite several persons to join the committee: Dr. Elmer Sharp, city councilman; Terry Drake, BPU; Jim Maier, principal of Rosedale Middle School; Larry Hanks, Landmarks Commission and KCK Economic Development Dept.; Bert Cavin, KCK Parks Dept.; Richard McCray and Herb Butt, Rainbow Division Veterans and Ralph Lickteig, American

Legion Post #346. This new committee became a new separate committee.

The committee looked into various improvements such as lighting, handicapped ramp, security measures, etc. These improvements identified the need for a park master plan. Otherwise each project would have to be submitted separately for approval to the Landmarks Commission. The committee formulated questionnaires to seek out ideas for improvements. The RDA agreed to underwrite the costs of a master plan. Three architectural firms submitted bids: Gould & Evans, McKnight and Associates and Lawrence Goldblatt Co. The committee selected McKnight & Associates because of their expertise in landscape architecture.

The master planning was done in two phases. The first involved compiling the information from questionnaires already acquired by the

committee and a public session of idea generation. From this information, a master plan was formulated. This master plan organizes and prioritizes improvements. Some of these improvements include a nature trail, antique lighting, a handicapped ramp, a water source, park benches, additional memorials, additional signage, low maintenance landscaping and more.

This master plan has been reduced to colorful drawings and slides. This master plan will be shown at:

Fisher St.

On Tuesday, January 26th, the City investigated the parking situation on Fisher from 43rd to 45th street. This was done after RDA reported that residents were concerned about the width of the street. When cars are parked on both sides of the street it creates a tight squeeze for through traffic.

According to Marlin Nevels, City Traffic Regulations officer, the street is wide enough to accommodate parking on both sides and still provide room for emergency vehicles to pass through. Legally the street is wide enough. The only way to provide a more open roadway is for residents on one side of the street to voluntarily give up their streetside parking. This would permit parking on one side of the street only.

Home Enhancement Loan Program

The Home Enhancement Loan Program, better known as HELP, is a low interest loan program designed to assist lower income KCK homeowners. Qualified homeowners are assisted with financing for structural and other major rehabilitation work on their homes. This program is funded by City Community Development Block Grant funds provided through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Activities under this program are intended to bring residential structures up to safe, decent and sanitary housing standards. These loans can be used to do rehabilitation in the following areas:

- HEATING SYSTEMS
- ELECRITICAL
- PTJIMBING

- SEWER & SEPTIC SYSTEMS
- STRUCTURAL (roofs, foundations)
- LEAD PAINT HAZARDS
- HANDICAP ACCESSIBILITY
- ENERGY EFFICIENCY

LOAN TERMS

- Maximum Loan \$25,000
- Interest Rate 3%
- Maximum Term 20 years

To qualify you must be an owner-occupant of a Kansas City, Kansas home. Only households with incomes between 35% and 80% of the median income (according to HUD income quidelines) may qualify. All applicants must show the ability to repay this loan. This loan must not cause an undue financial burden on the recipient.

Gardens Can Add Value To Home

Part One: Take A Look Around You

The first thing one thinks of when imagining their fantasy garden is the lush, vibrant and interesting finished product. In order to attain that look one must first study the lay of the land.

Whether refurbishing an old garden or starting from scratch, it is important to understand the physical characteristics of the entire property...existing trees, slopes, exposure to sun and wind, drainage patterns... and also to know the hidden or unobtrusive danger spots. Where are the underground power lines, water lines, septic system pipes? Can trees be planted beneath

overhead power lines? Answers to these "danger" questions are as close as your phone. Whenever you dig beyond twelve inches in an unknown area of your yard, be certain you first call the utility companies' hot line 1-800-DIG-SAFE. A representative will come to your home and mark all underground lines and systems at no cost.

Depending on the expanse of the yard being landscaped, it may be important for you to obtain a site plan of your property showing the legal boundaries and easements. No one wants to plant a \$200 tree or install a perennial border only to discover they are on the neighbor's property which is going to be fenced. Site plans and surveys are useful as you stroll around your property;



nothing, however, beats your own observation. Take notes throughout the four seasons. How does the yard drain? Which areas receive sun? Which remain mostly shaded? What areas are visually important as you look outward from inside the house? Where should a play area be? Does firewood need to be stacked by the house? Does a patio or deck need a shade tree? Try to think of all the times you've said "I wish" regarding changes in your yard and then sit down with pencil and paper and begin to draw on the site plan the additions of beds and trees that will give the property the aesthetic look and useful layout you envision.

In the next edition of the Rosedale newsletter we'll describe the method for taking a soil sample and some thoughts on design. In the meantime, observe your property carefully while you think of spring!

Last year the city Traffic Division conducted a study of the problem and has recommended the installation of flashing yellow lights one block in advance of the cross walk and traffic signals suspended over the street. The city is hopeful that installation can begin by the second half of March.

City Sign Code Changes

Changes in city codes regarding business signs were approved by the Kansas City, Kan., city council to accommodate small business owners.

Steve Speise, city planning director, said the changes should help some businesses save expenses, and aid city officials in enforcing the codes.

The council also approved an addition to the codes to regulate businesses' outdoor lighting to a small extent. In the past outdoor lighting standards were not included in the codes.

The major code changes on signs are as follows:

*Allow reuse of existing sign structures and sign cans when in good condition even if they do not meet

current requirements.

•Allow somewhat larger signs than in the past especially for businesses with small exterior wall areas.

•Allow changeable message sign under certain conditions.

•Allow lesser setbacks when on a street with a large undeveloped right-of-way.

•Allow up to two offpremise directional signs for residential land developments without a special use permit. The developer though would need a basic sign permit and have the landowner's approval.

Also a clarification was added that signs inside windows of businesses can be used without permits.

More information on the code changes can be obtained at the city planning office at city hall.
