Belrose Meeting and Rally

Several weeks ago a meeting was held at Bell Center between area residents, landlords, social service providers, government officials and the KCK Housing Authority to look at reducing crime in and around public housing, specifically in Belrose Manor. As a result of this somewhat tense meeting and a subsequent meeting, several ideas have come to light that might help with the problems.

The first, and most visible, was to hold the City's first Anti-Crime Rally of the year in Belrose. Which we did on May 13th. Many of the residents came out to join us in the march. A number of the children kept the Mayor afterward to sign autographs. This march was a way to tell the criminal element that their behaviors would no longer be tolerated and to show support for the majority of law abiding residents who are struggling to raise a family in Belrose.

The Hilltop Neighborhood Group, whose area includes Belrose, is reaching out to those who live in the complex and inviting them to join in the neighborhood group. They plan to distribute Welcome Baskets to all new residents in the area including those in Belrose. We hope this will make law abiding people feel a part of the community while informing law breakers of a strong, watchful neighborhood that will work with the police and city to make their lives miserable.

The Mayor and Housing Authority are also looking at the possibility of creating a restricted traffic flow in and out of Belrose Manor and to this end will be making a survey of traffic flow and patterns.

The Housing Authority is considering setting up a Hot Line for residents to anonymously turn in information on criminal activity.

We are also looking at the possibility of changes in State law to allow faster and easier evictions for behaviors that endanger the welfare of others. Forrest Rhea is currently leading this effort.

Belrose property is well maintained and by the Housing Authority. It is the behaviors of a few residents and outsiders who hang out in Belrose that are causing the problems. We fully realize that their are also problems in the area surrounding Belrose. Both of these areas must be addressed together if we ever hope to have a safe neighborhood without gunfire and violence.

I hope what we start here will have a positive impact on all public housing throughout the city. This includes privately managed properties such as Silver City Apts. Its not fair to the children and their families who live in or around public supported housing to have to put up with the violence. We must do whatever possible to stop the violence and crime that the children see every day.


