Strategic Plan

This month our focus is on the youth development aspect of our strategic plan. We hope to strengthen connections with youth and that youth who participate will show an increase in positive behaviors.

- Youth programs will have been established at 3 schools in Rosedale to encourage positive behaviors and parental involvement.
- 450 youth will have participated in youth programs with the goal of building relationships with caring adults, developing leadership skills, developing strong community connections.
- 70% of youth who participate in the Rosedale Saturday Academy and the Community TREE programs will increase their GPA by .15, they will decrease unexcused absences, they will decrease the number of documented reports of disciplinary action in the quarter in which they participate in the programs.

Rosedalians Reaching Out

Job Title: Adult Sponsor of Community TREE Responsibilities: TREE stands for (Teach, Responsibility, Educate, and Empower). The Rosedale Development Association has received funds from the H&R Block Foundation to help youth make positive contributions in the building of a stronger Rosedale community. Through the use of mini grants from \$50 to \$150 Rosedale youth (ages 11-16) work with an adult sponsor to carry out community service projects. Adults assist youth as they write a proposal for a mini grant, and present the proposal to the RDA staff. Adults provide guidance, coaching and feedback to the youth during the duration of their project and are present on the day(s) of the project. Some Community TREE projects that are coming up in the near future that you can assist with are:

- Running a bingo night at Rosedale Towers
- Creating May Day baskets for Rosedale residents.
- Creating decorations for Flag Day.
- Planting trees on Arbor Day.
- Escorting youth to Topeka so that they can serve as pages.

<u>Qualifications:</u> Enjoy working with youth, coaching them.

<u>Time Commitment:</u> Depends on the length of the project, usually 10 hours over three weeks.

<u>Benefits:</u> The opportunity to inspire, mentor and possibly teach youth new skills.

Rosedale History

Hattie Hatfield has been a Rosedale resident all of his life. As a youth he remembers going to the Rosedale swimming pool near Rosedale High School. In the winter, when it would snow, Hattie would shovel sidewalks to earn money. Snow was also an opportunity for celebration, as people would light bonfires and kids would sled down the streets. Another popular activity were ball games in the streets. Hattie remembers playing in Hudson Rd., which is now Rainbow Blvd. The depression hit Rosedale hard. "We was tickled to death to get about anything in those days," Hattie said. Like many others, Hattie's family was on relief. Because both of his parents were ill, Hattie remembers that he had to make the trip to the fire station, which was the city hall, jail and police station all in one, every Tuesday to get the family's grocery order. Groceries cost \$6.66 a week for three people and Hattie remembers eating a lot of beans and pork. Trash collection was done in a horse drawn

wagon that had eight drums in it. Hattie remembers that the trash would leak all over the neighborhood. When Hattie broke his shoulder playing football at Rosedale High School, he went to Bell Memorial Hospital, which was in an old GI barracks and still had wooden sidewalks around it. The hospital bill was 25 cents, but during the depression even that bill was difficult to pay. Hattie's parents died when he was sixteen, he guit school and went to work for the Jones Store Co. Eventually Hattie was able to go into business for himself and built a bar at the site of an old filling station. He then opened a second bar and finally a bingo parlor. Bingo, however, was not always an acceptable pastime. When it was illegal, bingo was played at the VFW post. When Hattie and his friends were caught, they were fined \$25, but they always knew when they were going to be caught. On such occasions, the police would say that they had to take all the money being gambled, but would only take \$20 and leave the rest. The Chief of Police, after all, belonged to the VFW post. Hattie remembers one night in particular, when the head of the vice squad broke up a bingo session and cleared everyone out. He was then beat over the head with a purse by an irate woman who was yelling, "You're no son of mine!" The policeman's only response to his mother was: "The mayor's mother made me do it!" Bingo was legalized in 1966, and Hattie claims to have had the first bingo license in Kansas City, KS. Though many thing have changed over the years some things have not. Hattie still has his bingo parlor, Hattie's Moo Cow, on 47th St.


