



Community T.R.E.E.

It takes many people working together to improve Rosedale. This includes our youth. Last year 64 youth were involved in Community T.R.E.E. projects, putting in a total of 651 hours of community service. T.R.E.E. stands for teach responsibility, educate, and empower. Community T.R.E.E. youth have also done projects such as leading bingo



The survey consists of an interior and exterior security and safety check of your property. Officer Wilt can be contacted at (913) 573-8720 or paged at (816) 497-0349. You should allow half an hour of your time during the day or evening for the survey.

Rosedale History

Charlie Green's connections to Rosedale run deep. His grandfather moved to Rosedale in 1903 and built the house Charlie now lives in. His father owned Rosedale Radio, which opened in 1932. Charlie remembers watching Dagwoods being built from his father's shop. He attended Whitmore School and Rosedale High School. He would swim and fish in Turkey Creek with his friends. They used to jump from a railroad bridge into Turkey Creek. The Rosedale Baseball Park was across from the Rosedale Mineral Bath. The Mineral Bath was discovered when workers were

digging for coal and instead struck gas heated mineral water. In the winter children would go sledding down Mission Rd. The city would put hay at the bottom of the hill to stop and cushion them. The streetcar could be taken downtown for only a nickel and he could go to the movies and buy popcorn for less than a quarter. Southwest Blvd. was once Highway 10 and brought a lot of traffic through Rosedale. Charlie describes Southwest Blvd. then as "pretty lively". There was a rivalry between Rosedale and Argentine, which would sometimes breakout into fighting. Charlie be-

came a brick layer and helped to build many of the buildings in Rosedale. Charlie lived in Las Vegas and Hawaii, but he always got the "Boulevard Blues" and came back to Rosedale. Charlie is well known in Rosedale for the 58ft. steel sailboat he built in his backyard. The Conjetta Lee was built over two years and launched near the Seventh St. bridge over the Kaw River. Charlie and his friends took the Conjetta Lee to the Gulf of Mexico. He has had his share of adventures both in and out of Rosedale.

Krystal Loeber is a new and spirited volunteer for the Rose-





Studio 804



Third year graduate students at University of Kansas School of Architecture and Urban Design are involved in a unique experience. Studio804 is a program in which students design and build their own project. Students focus on creating an affordable and efficient house. This year stu-

dents are building a single family home in Rosedale, the first time a Studio804 home has been built outside of Lawrence. City Vision Ministries is financing the home. The house was built in five pieces in a

warehouse in Lawrence. Brain Finan, a student working on the project, said having to move the house created challenges. The house was limited in size by the dimensions of the warehouse door and the height of bridges on the highway. In the middle of April, the sections were brought

to Rosedale and each piece was set into place. Finan said it was rewarding, when the sections were fitted onto the foundation without any problems. The KU students have utilized unusual materials such as aluminum, bamboo, and a Brazilian hardwood called Massaranduba, in building the house. An open house will be held May 22 from 11a.m. to 2 p.m. at 2808 Lloyd. Because the site is at the end of a dead end street, we ask that those who attend the open house do not park on the street. The studio804 house promises to be a unique addition to Rosedale.



Excellence in Education Survey

Teachers of Excellence in Education students were recently surveyed, in order to measure the effectiveness of the program. 95% of respondents agree or strongly agree that youth display behaviors indicating that they are proud to receive the Excellence in Education award. 100% of respondents agree or strongly agree that youth who receive the award continue their positive

school performance. Approximately two thirds of the respondents are undecided or do not think the award motivates students who do not receive the award to improve their performance. 71% of the respondents are undecided or do not think the Excellence in Education program has increased parent involvement in the education process. 95% of respondents agree

or strongly agree that the program is beneficial to the school. 77% of respondents agree or strongly agree that the Excellence in Education program has increased their belief that the community supports the work of the teachers and staff at their respective schools. Rosedale History_

Mr. & Mrs. Walburg will celebrate their 70th wedding anniversary next January. Both have been part of the Rosedale community all their lives. Mr. Walburg's family immigrated from Sweden around 1900. His father operated a dairy on Puckett Rd., which was just mud and rocks. Unlike it is today, the area was clear of small trees and overgrowth, providing a good pasture for the cows. Mr. Walburg would milk twenty-five cows by hand. The milk was delivered in glass bottles to houses, grocery stores, and the Bell Memorial Hospital. It sold for ten cents a quart. Empty milk bottles would be collected, washed, and reused. In 1939, Mr. Walburg

took over his father's business. Around that time they bought a milking machine and new federal regulations required that the milk be pasteurized. Mr. Walburg sold the dairy in 1948. Mrs. Walburg grew up at 4500 Lloyd. Her parents owned one of the first houses built on Lloyd and her father had a horse, a cow, a garden, and a orchard. In the winter, they would bury their vegetables in a swallow trench and cover them with straw and dirt. During the summer they would hang the milk down in the well, in order to keep it cool. Mrs. Walburg remembers the building of the First Congregational Church at 4326 Lloyd. The congregation ran out of

funds before the building could be completed, so for awhile the church was just a basement. Mr. & Mrs. Walburg also remember the construction of the Rosedale High School football stadium. A carnival was held to raise money for the project. Mrs. Walburg was part of the Girl's Athletics Association (GAA). One major activity she participated in, with the GAA, was a walk from Rosedale to Swope Park. They were able to ride the streetcar back. Walking was the best way to get around. Even if they took the streetcar, they would have to walk to the stop. Mr. & Mrs. Walburg think that all the walking they did keeps them active today.

The teams were competing against each other to see who could collect the most. It was not all competition though. The youth had a goal of collecting 100 pounds of food total. When the final collection was turned

into Cross Lines, it was estimated that the youth had collected over 300 pounds of food. All the youth received prizes and had a party in the park for their efforts. The whole event was a Community TREE project designed by Melina Hernandez, Fabiola Hernandez, Ilham Abuanga, and Charles Holmes. Rosedale History_

Harold Strasser started working for his father, sweeping floors and running odd jobs, when he was ten. By the age of twelve, he could wire a house by himself. His father started Rosedale Plumbing and Electric in 1917 with a cousin. Harold's father was a councilman when the fire department bought its first truck. Harold said riding on the fire truck as a kid, was the thrill of his life. There was only one fireman, who would drive the truck to the site of the fire. Then, the councilmen and the neighbors would help fight the fire. In 1920, the cousin left the business and it became Strasser Hardware. When Harold graduated from high school in 1926, his father offered him a partnership in the business. He agreed only if they would expand. Strasser Hardware moved to its current location at 910 Southwest Blvd., which was the Masonic Lodge. There was a man that everyone called Scotty who worked in the Masonic Lodge. After living in Rosedale for thirty years, it was discovered that he had murdered his wife

when he lived back East. The news came as quite a shock, as he was always well-liked. In 1956, Harold became the sole owner of Stasser Hardware. While Strasser Hardware has grown, many changes have occurred in Rosedale too. Trains would park in the switching yard behind Strasser Hardware. People would swarm to the trains and fill gunny sacks with coal or grain in order to sell it. Harold remembers one boy going so far as to bore a hole in a train car and filling his sack with grain. Three grain elevators along the tracks, burned down in a big fire. They were wood frame buildings with metal exterior. Harold said, "The fire got so hot that the metal sheets would float around red hot just like a leaf in the air." The Frank Rushton Bakery also suffered from a fire. As a result, the bakery built to replace the one that burned down was mostly concrete. This is the building that stands today in the 800 block of Southwest Blvd. Rosedale has also been struck by multiple floods. Strasser Hardware is at the border where the

flooding would stop, but they would have recorded sales in pumps, mops, and buckets during these times. Rosedale has been through a lot. Through all the ups a downs, Strasser Hardware has been a solid fixture in Rosedale. Today Harold's son is the president of the company and Strasser Hardware has grown from a store of only one or two employees to one of 115 employees.

Animal Control_

It is no secret that the Kansas City area has a serious animal control problem. An article appeared in the Aug. 4 edition of the Star citing the city's troubles with large numbers of stray dogs and cats. In 2003, 2,193 dogs and 677 cats were picked up in Wyandotte County, and another 993 dogs and cats were killed by vehicles. Through June of this year, 1,254 dogs and 275 cats were rounded up in the county, with another 398 having been killed by vehicles. Many residents have become concerned about wild dogs roaming the neighborhoods and the safety issues that result. People are afraid to walk the streets with lots of untamed dogs running around. The widespread presence of stray animals devalues and degrades communities. RDA has begun to tackle this problem in Rosedale. Last month, several members of the community, including Wendy

Wilson, RDA's executive director, made a presentation to the Unified Government in which they urged the commissioners to increase funding for animal control and to appoint a task force to examine the issue on a deeper level. The government responded, allocating \$125,000 to the 2005 budget and setting up the proposed task force. In order to truly solve the problem, however, residents and community leaders must be willing to take an active role. Responsible pet ownership, which includes spaying, neutering, and/or licensing, is a critical way to reduce animal control problems. Adopting neglected or abused pets from animal shelters is another way to help. Ultimately, education about the issue will make a big difference. Community TREE

One of RDA's main goals is youth enrichment. As a way to meet that goal, RDA established the Community TREE program. The program is designed to empower youth to take ownership and pride in their community. and to learn how to become responsible citizens. Youth (ages 11-15) develop a service project in the Rosedale community and then apply for a mini-grant (up to \$150) to fund the project. The students can apply as individuals or as a group. They work with an adult sponsor in completing their project. There have been almost 50 Community TREE projects in the last two years. Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design_

Rosedale residents should be aware of Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), pronounced [sep-ted]. CPTED is a concept that seeks to prevent crime before it happens through the structure and layout of buildings, streets, lights, and other physical features. According to the National Crime Prevention Institute, "the proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime, and an improvement of the quality of life." There are four overlapping CPTED strategies: natural sur-

veillance, territorial reinforcement, natural access control, and target hardening. These strategies work to increase visibility in public areas, expand areas of safety, reduce opportunities for criminal activity, and build a sense of responsibility and trust among community residents. Some examples of CPTED techniques include: making sure dark areas are well-lit, using motiondetector lights, keeping house numbers, front doors, and windows visible from the street, ensuring that locks and alarm systems are operational, and strategic landscaping of trees, shrubs,

and other plants. By effectively employing CPTED strategies and techniques, residents can build a safer community in a relatively simple, clean, and inexpensive manner. Kansas City, Kan.
