
In addition to Team Office, which will provide new furniture, there are several other local companies that are participating in the Makeover.

nother year down, another year of Accomplishments in the Rosedale community. So what difference has RDA made in the lives of those who live and work in Rosedale? 74 individuals received food and other household products for Thanksgiving. A total of 28 minor home repairs were completed, assisting elderly, disabled, and other lowincome homeowners. More than 400 volunteers helped with neighborhood clean-ups, newsletter mailings, home repairs, youth programs, and transforming the formerly vacant lot behind the Koch Center, our community center located next door to our office. More than 100 local youth participated in our Youth Academy, tennis lessons, disc golf lessons, chess club, and service projects to improve the lives of others in the community.

Southwest Blvd. was finally paved, as was Mission Rd. and S. Minnie hill. A new home was built on Shawnee Road by KU architecture students and City Vision Ministries. A new Master Plan was approved for the eastern portion of Rosedale that will set the tone for future development. Crime is down and property values are up.

As we look toward 2006 and the future, we will place an increased focus on supporting youth to become successful adults. RDA and the KU School of Social Welfare plan to work at Rosedale Middle School with students who are struggling to read at grade level. If one cannot read well, it greatly diminishes their future life opportunities. And we are all about our youth having opportunities. Our goal is to recruit and train community volunteers to work with the school to raise the reading and math scores of our children. RDA wants to see our kids dream of attending college and have the strong educational foundation that allows them to reach this dream, whatever it takes. We want them to be able to buy a home in Rosedale and to raise their children in the community that nurtured them.

On the physical development side, we will formulate a property development plan that focuses on creating earned income for RDA and improving Rosedale. To reach this goal we are add-

ing new Board members with expertise in real estate and non-profit housing development. We also plan to assist area businesses by hosting a series of 6 educational sessions that will equip each participating business with the tools to improve their bottom line.

RDA to help distribute free home winterization kits

Due to expected increases in home heating bills this winter, RDA is partnering with the Kansas Warm Homes Project to provide winterization kits to low to moderate income Rosedale residents, as well as to those on fixed incomes (such as retirees and elderly).

To qualify for the program, individuals and families must fall below 150% of the federal poverty level (\$14,355 for an individual, \$29,025 for a family of 4). The kits contain a variety of tools and materials to improve insulation in older and substandard homes, including: plastic sheeting to cover windows and doors, rope and acrylic caulking to seal cracks, and switch plate insulators to help stop cold-air drafts. The kits also contain water saving devices (low-flow shower heads and aerators) and energy saving fluorescent bulbs.





Pounded in 1929, Sol's Glass is a 3rd-generation family-owned business located in the heart of Rosedale, just behind RDA's office. It is the oldest glass company in Kansas City.

Sol's is a "full service commercial glass company," providing customers with an array of glass products and services, including installation of storm windows, door windows, table tops, mirrors, and more. The company has a variety of types of glass in stock, suitable for any purpose or need (although it does not handle automobile glass work). As a company that has been around for a long time, it is no wonder that Sol's is a trusted and popular choice when it comes to glass.

Sol's is owned by Louis
Malashock, the grandson of the original owner, Sol Kopitnik. For about its first 65 years of existence, the company was located at 18th and Locust in downtown Kansas City, Mo. Then, approximately 10 years ago, Sol's moved to its current location in Rosedale.



Utility tax rebate available to KCK seniors

From Jan. 4 – March 31, 2006, senior citizens will be able to take advantage of a utility tax rebate. The program offers senior citizens a refund on a portion of the amount paid for utilities during 2005. Persons applying must be 65 years of age during the entire year of 2005, live in the city of Kansas City, Kan., and their total income must not exceed \$10,000. The maximum rebate is \$150.

Applications will be taken at the Municipal Office Building East, 701 N. 7th St., Room 323, KCK, in the Unified Government Clerk's Office. Eligible persons should bring all gas, telephone, and BPU bills paid during 2005; proof of income, Social Security statements, interest statements, etc; and Social Security number.
