

Rosedale Knights compete in first chess tournament

On Saturday morning, March 25, members of the Rosedale Knights Chess Club participated in the Turner Community Chess Tournament, held in the Turner Recreation Center gymnasium in Kansas City, Kan. It was the first official tournament experience for the Rosedale Knights.

The Club performed exceptionally well at the tournament. Al De La Rosa. sixth-grader at Rosedale Middle School, received the 3rd place trophy for the 4th-6th grade age group. Several of the Club members won at least one of their matches. Most importantly, however, all of the members upheld the Club's core ethics of respect, sportsmanship, and integrity. They represented Rosedale in a positive way and RDA is proud of their achievement.

The Rosedale Knights form one of RDA's primary youth programs. Cosponsored by Ioel Goering, RDA's voluntary service worker, and Jeremy Lewis, project manager for St. Luke's Hospital, the Knights have been in existence since February 2005. Founded by a small group, the Club continues to attract new members. There are currently 12 youth enrolled in the program.

The group meets every Thursday after school from 3:30-6:00 p.m. at the Koch Community Center (1401 Southwest Blvd., next to RDA's office). The club is open to fifth- through seventh- graders who attend local elementary and middle schools. Both boys and girls are welcome.

Each session consists of a lesson in which chess strategies and tactics are taught, as well as time for individual and team match play. The youth are also given the opportunity to complete homework and engage in fun leisure activity (i.e. playing board games, playing in Whitmore Park across the street,

Turkey Creek flood mitigation project update

To alleviate the possibility of future I flooding in the areas surrounding Turkey Creek (which winds through the heart of Rosedale), several individuals and organizations have been advocating for flood control efforts and for federal funding to make it happen.

Progress is well under way thanks to the dedicated efforts of Dan Fuhrman, owner of Schutte Lumber Co., and others who continue to lobby for the project and for federal dollars. Last week a group calling itself the Turkey Creek Coordinating Group (TCCG) met at Schutte Lumber Co. to discuss progress, provide project input and strengthen the communication process between the main stakeholders.

The TCCG recently became aware

of the serious deterioration of the Turkey Creek Tunnel that diverts the creek under I-35 and into the Kansas River. Within the first 476 feet, the side walls of the tunnel had deteriorated, resulting in an erosion cavity 80 feet wide. The tunnel floor was missing in most places and some of the ceiling had collapsed creating a mound of debris. Fuhrman, who informed RDA of the condition, called a meeting with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to discuss the likelihood of a collapse.

Since this meeting significant repairs have been made, including bolting the vaulted ceiling to the overlying bedrock and filling most of the

voids. Repair of the tunnel is currently receiving the highest priority for federal funding. A second phase of tunnel work is slated to begin in October of this year. Annual inspections of the tunnel will be required. The Corps, the City of KCMO and the U.G. will share the responsibility for these inspections. The budget for the tunnel work in phases 1 and 2 is \$6.5 million.

Additional work is planned for construction of a levee along the creek at an estimated cost of \$1 million to \$1.5 million. The levee will be constructed to accommodate a hiking/biking trail on top. In addition, work on two railroad bridges in the Turkey Creek area is in the planning phase. The goal is to dovetail the construction work with a planned reduction in rail traffic brought about by work on a R.R. bridge over the Missouri River.

Much of the future work depends on the allocation of federal funds in the next several years. Aides of Senator Bond, Representative Moore and Representative Cleaver were present at the most recent meeting of the TCCG. Members of the Kansas City Industrial Council have pressed the case for funding this project by traveling to Washington, D.C.

The TCCG plans to hold quarterly meetings to stay abreast of the issues and ensure a good communication flow. The group will meet again in May for an update and to discuss hiking/biking trails and a levee design that would accommodate construction of soccer fields.


Rosedale History Quiz


Meet our new code enforcement officer

Attention Rosedale high-school students and business owners!

Planning and preparation for RDA's annual Summer Youth Employment program is under way. The program places high school-age youth (ages 14-16) in a job at a local business for 6-8 weeks during the summer. Each youth is required to attend employment skills training sessions at the beginning of the summer. The youth are paid minimum wage through an RDA-administered grant from the Board of Public Utilities.

Youth who would like to apply for the program may contact the RDA office and ask to speak with Joel Goering, program coordinator. Applications must be returned to the RDA office by May 12.

RDA is also looking for Rosedale businesses that are interested in hosting and supervising a youth for the summer. The program is a great way for businesses to gain some extra help for the summer at no extra cost (since RDA pays the youth). Participating businesses are simply responsible for supervising the youth throughout their term of employment. RDA will take care of any disciplinary actions, should they be necessary.

Rosedale Community Transportation Survey report completed

over the past year, RDA has been working behind the scenes on an issue of tremendous importance to urban communities such as Rosedale: public transportation. More specifically, RDA has sought to advocate for more public transit options in the lower half of Rosedale (west of I-35).

The most recent development in this advocacy effort is the completion of the final report on the Rosedale Community Transportation Survey, conducted and analyzed with the assistance of the KU-KCK Partnership Center, a project of the University of Kansas School of Social Welfare. This is actually the second survey that RDA has conducted in lower Rosedale (the first was at Rosedale Ridge Apartments, a low-income housing complex). Not surprisingly, the results of the survey demonstrate a real need for public transportation in the lower half of Rosedale.

The impetus for the survey came from RDA's role as the resource and advocacy center for the Rosedale community. In this capacity, RDA became aware of a severe lack of public transportation options in the lower half of Rosedale. The closest KCATA bus stop for most residents in this area is more than a mile away, located at Southwest Blvd. and Rainbow Blvd. Without easy access to public transit, employment possibilities and other modes of eco-

nomic development are significantly hampered.

Some highlights of the survey:

- 73% of survey participants indicated they would use public transportation if it were within a 10-minute walk from where they live
- 90% of these "probable users" said they would support a small tax increase in Wyandotte County if the money raised from the tax would only be used to expand public transit access within the county
- Even among people who said they would *not* use public transportation, 93% said they still wanted it in the area and 62% were willing to support the aforementioned tax increase
- 58% of survey participants reported they have missed important events, i.e. work, school, church, etc., because they do not have reliable transportation

Using the results from this survey and the Rosedale Ridge survey, RDA will continue to push for more public transit options in the lower part of Rosedale. 

Rosedale Ridge children learn about healthy habits

Investments in public health are vitally important to the long-term security and well-being of our society. On May 11 and May 16, one such investment – albeit small – was made at the Rosedale Ridge Apartments, a low-income housing complex in Rosedale.


During those two days, five doctors from the University of Kansas Medical Center (KUMC) and a fitness instructor from the Southwest Blvd. Health Clinic worked with about 20 elementary school-age kids from Rosedale Ridge Apartments during the 2nd annual Rosedale Ridge Health Fair.

The kids learned about a variety of important health topics, including: personal and dental hygiene, physical fitness and exercise, first aid, substance abuse, and healthy eating. By disseminating information on these topics to kids at an early age, longer-term illnesses and diseases can be prevented and general health and well-being can be promoted.

All of the doctors from KUMC were from the Family Medicine Department. The Health Fair was part of the community health component of their academic program. Each of them prepared a "hands-on" presentation on one or more of the aforementioned topics. The participating doctors were: Dr. Eleanor Lisbon, Dr. Biren Shah, Dr. Hannah Echalier, Dr. Holly Cranston, and Dr. Savitri Manda.

In addition, Priscilla Allen, an instructor from the Southwest Blvd. Health Clinic, presented a mini-workshop on physical fitness and exercise. She demonstrated strength-building techniques and exercises to the kids that they can use on their own. She also discussed with them the value of appropriate amounts of physical activity and sleep.

Two research coordinators from Kansas City Allergy and Asthma Associates also attended the Health Fair and tested the kids for asthma and other




in the photo are on the front of the building above the doors. The building (and the statues) can still be seen today, although the Rushton Bakery no longer exists.


