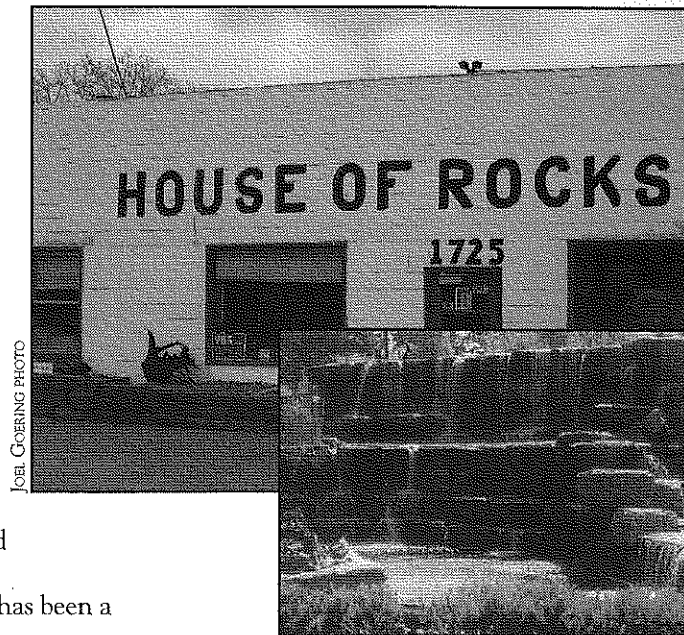

Now that spring is on the way and summer is just around the corner, many people will be thinking about ways to improve their homes or properties. If you are one of those people – and if your plans include installing a new patio or water garden, building a retaining wall or stone archway, or some other landscaping project – then you need to visit House of Rocks, located just outside of Rosedale near the intersection of Merriam Lane and the 18th St. Expressway.

House of Rocks, which has been a long-time RDA supporter, is a supplier of many kinds of rocks, boulders, stone, gravel, and more. The company sells decorative gravel and boulders, flagstone, patio stone, veneer, rubble, cut wall stone, edging, premium mulch, and pond liners.

Typical projects of House of Rocks customers include swimming pools, back-porch patios, barbecue pits, retaining walls, fountains, and gardens.

Although House of Rocks still considers itself a small business, it imports materials from as far away as

Mexico and receives orders from across the United States. According to owner Jack Robinson, 70-80% of the company's current business is wholesale commercial, i.e. landscapers, designers, builders, stone masons, etc., and the remainder is "walk-in retail" residential.

"We treat everybody like a neighbor, like family," says Robinson, whose mother was born in Rosedale. "As a business, you can't lose your roots. We try to be fair and honest with everybody."

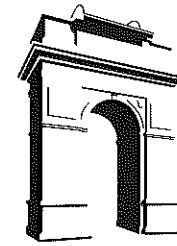
House of Rocks started as a supplier of gem and mineral specimens, but over the years, the company has evolved and added many types of rocks and landscaping materials to its inventory. The company's first location was near 75th St. and Metcalf, but it moved to its current location in the early 1970s. Robinson became sole owner in 1984. ☐

Mission Cliffs housing development making noticeable progress

Have you driven or walked by the corner of Lake Ave. and Minnie St. in Rosedale lately? If so, you have seen the remarkable transformation taking place, as the first phase of a 115-home development is currently underway and nearing completion.

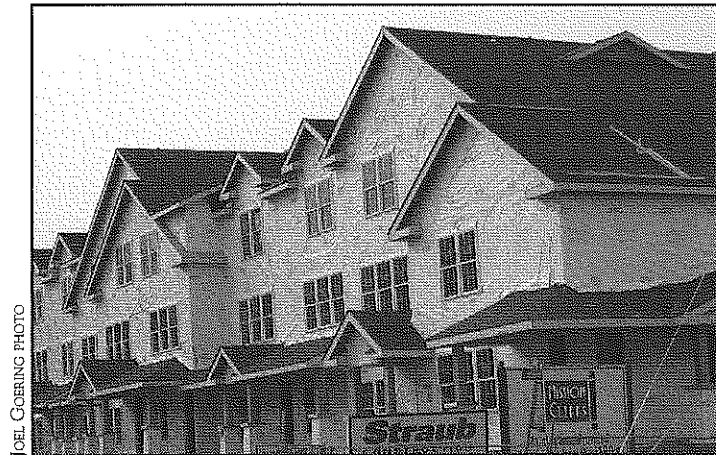
The construction of the single-family townhomes and single-family detached homes represents the fulfillment of a vision that was initiated nearly a decade ago by members of the Rosedale community and RDA. The vision was to reclaim and revitalize a historic neighborhood that had fallen into disrepair by building new owner-occupied housing and strengthening the fabric of the community.

Following the construction of several infill homes in nearby Rainbow Park in recent years, the Mission Cliffs project – which will be completed in several stages – is the next step in the neighborhood's re-development process.

The project is a partnership between RDA, City Vision Ministries, the Unified Government, Brotherhood Bank, Fannie Mae, and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Straub Construction is the general contractor, while Robben Development Company is responsible for marketing and sales.

RDA is especially grateful to City Vision Ministries, a fellow not-for-profit community development corporation based in Kansas City, Kan., for its expertise, resources, and drive that made the project succeed. City Vision will be holding its 15th anniversary celebration at the Mission Cliffs site on April 27. Guests will be treated to one of the first tours of the new townhomes.

KCK Animal Control heading in right direction

Sometimes, surprises are good. A recent visit to the George Lee Dunn Animal Shelter and Control Facility – Kansas City Kansas's city-run animal shelter – was indeed such a pleasant surprise.

Capt. Henry Horn, on special assignment from the Chief's Office as Director of KCK Animal Control (AC), had invited me to tour the facility located at 3301 Park Dr. and discuss recent physical and operational changes. Capt. Horn has instituted a number of positive changes, many of them recommended by the Animal Control Task Force in 2005.

Among the physical improvements, an outdoor fenced area has been constructed that allows potential adopters to interact with an animal prior to adoption. The animal holding areas have been repainted and resurfaced, and the facility has a new parking lot, as well. During my visit, the entire facility was very bright and clean.

Improvements in the shelter operations are even more exciting. All staff members are receiving ongoing training. AC has entered into an agreement with

the Greater Kansas City Humane Society to alter all adopted animals. Dogs are being assessed for temperament prior to adoption. The shelter has also developed relationships with a variety of licensed rescue groups in Kansas who assist in getting animals into "forever homes."

In addition, AC is partnering with Spay & Neuter Kansas City to offer a series of low-cost rabies vaccination and microchip clinics for all KCK residents. These clinics will be held at various locations throughout the city. We are hopeful that Rosedale will be a chosen site in the near future.

Public outreach and education on local animal control ordinances, including the mandatory spay/neuter of any cat or dog over 6 months of age, has improved. This includes free Spay/Neuter Vouchers for those who qualify through the low-cost rabies and microchip clinics.

Capt. Horn has taken on the challenge of upgrading KCK Animal Control and is making excellent progress to provide a caring atmosphere for lost and unwanted animals. I applaud his efforts.

KU Med students join with RDA staff to clean up Mission Rd.

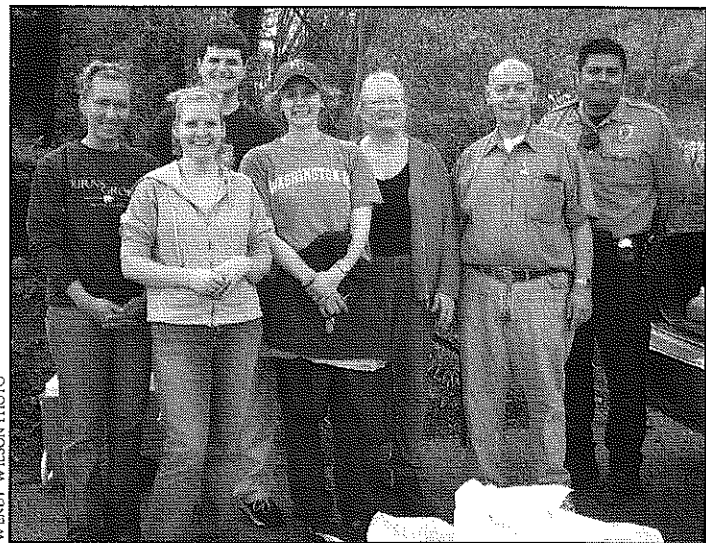
The four KU Med volunteers were joined by RDA staff members Wendy Wilson and Linda Wright, and Hill-top neighborhood group leader Forrest Rhea. The group worked for three hours,

contributing nearly \$350 worth of free labor. More importantly, the volunteers picked up enough trash to fill 38 full-size bags, thus making a significant impact on the aesthetic appearance of the Mission Rd. hill.

KCKPD community police officer Carlos Rodriguez supported the effort by directing traffic away from the volunteers.

The Mission Rd. hill is one of the main entrances to Rosedale, so its appearance can make a lasting impression on visitors and residents alike, regarding the community's quality and cleanliness.

Attention Rosedale high-school students and business owners!

Planning and preparation for RDA's annual Summer Youth Employment program is underway. The program places high school-age youth (ages 14-16) in a job at a local business for 6-8 weeks during the summer. Each youth is required to attend employment skills training sessions at the beginning of the summer. The youth are paid minimum wage through an RDA-administered grant from the Board of Public Utilities.

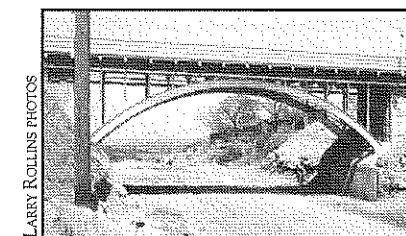

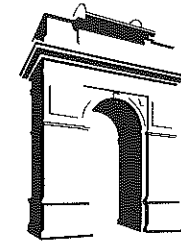

Firehouse Fiesta nets more than \$7,000 for Rosedale Freedom School

Talk about a party! To raise funds for the Rosedale Freedom School and to celebrate Cinco de Mayo, more than 200 persons attended the "Firehouse Fiesta" on May 5 held at the historic firestation home of Rick Bumgardner and Don Fields.

In a great success, more than \$7,000 was generated for the operation of Rosedale's first Freedom School, to be held at Rainbow Mennonite Church this summer.

The Freedom School will serve 100 children in grades K-8, most of whom will be from the Rosedale community. The school will operate for six weeks, Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. each day. The school opens in a few weeks, on June 18.

The Firehouse Fiesta was the brainchild of several key people, including: RDA Executive Director, Wendy Wilson; Rosedale Community Project supervisor, Donna Devine (and her daughter, Andrea Villasi - a marketing and fund development specialist); and of course, the owners of the firestation, Rick Bumgardner and Don Fields.

"Rick and Don had wanted to do a fundraiser for Rosedale for a long time," says Wilson. "The Freedom School presented the perfect opportunity to do so."

Bumgardner and Fields converted the former Rosedale Firestation #10 (located at 1166 Southwest Blvd.) into a luxury home several years ago. The remodeling work and interior decorating are so unique and fabulous that the home has been featured in *Kansas City Homes and Gardens* magazine and will be the subject of an upcoming documentary on HGTV.

At the Firehouse Fiesta, guests were treated to Latin American-themed foods and a sparkling margarita fountain. In

RDA wins "Partner of the Year Award" from City Vision Ministries

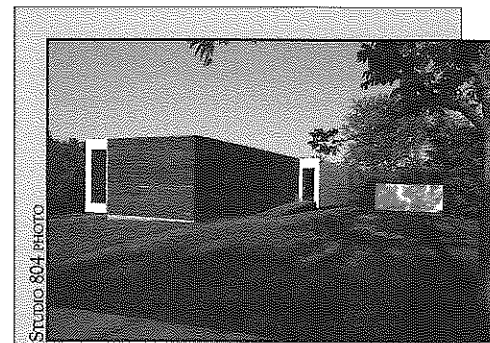
In a formal gesture that testifies to the intimate and collaborative relationship between the two organizations, City Vision Ministries presented RDA and Executive Director Wendy Wilson with its "Partner of the Year Award" for 2006.

The Award was given at City Vision's 15-year anniversary celebration on Friday, April 27, held at the new Mission Cliffs housing development in Rosedale. Mission Cliffs came about as a result of many partnerships, but one of the most critical was the one between RDA and City Vision.

Like RDA, City Vision is a not-for-profit community development corporation serving Kansas City, Kan. The two organizations worked together to build support for the Mission Cliffs project, develop community consensus, overcome numerous obstacles, and make sure the project kept moving.

Mission Cliffs is now taking shape at the intersection of Lake Ave. and Minnie St. in Rosedale. It will bring 115 new single-family townhomes and detached homes to the area, increasing homeownership rates and providing housing options in Rosedale for employees and students of the nearby University of Kansas Medical Center and other professionals.

Cruisin' in style: Chess Club members get limo ride, end school year with success

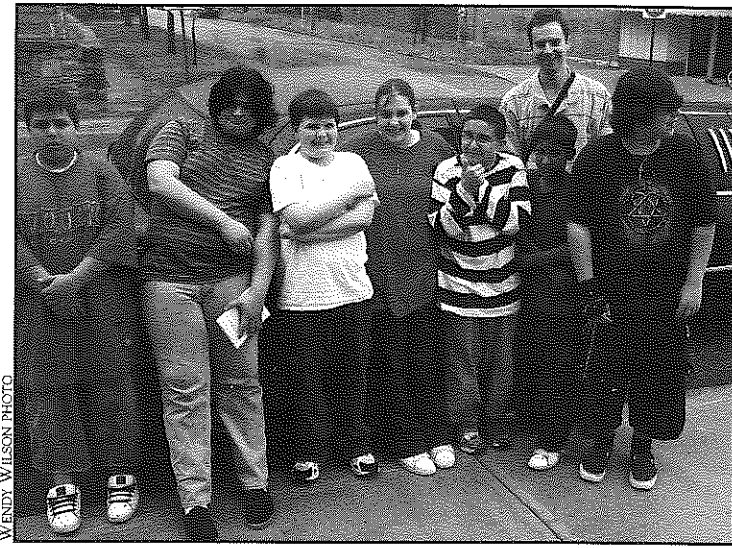
The Rosedale Knights Chess Club wrapped up its third year in existence with several fun events during the month of May.

One of RDA's primary youth development programs, the Rosedale Knights Chess Club has been in existence since February 2005. It meets during the school year once a week after school, serving primarily fifth- through eighth-graders. RDA staff member Joel Goering serves as the group's sponsor, along with two other adult volunteers.

For the 2006-07 school year, the

average attendance at weekly chess club gatherings was 12 youth, although the program served a total of 21 youth at some point during the year. The club is financially supported by the Rosedale Optimist Club and other RDA donors.

"Joining hands" to spruce up a Rosedale neighborhood asset

On Saturday, May 12, approximately 60 volunteers from RDA, Rainbow Mennonite Church, and Thrivent Financial for Lutherans came together to make improvements at Whitmore Park (the park across the street from the RDA office). The massive effort was a part of Join Hands Day, a national initiative designed to make a difference in communities through helpful projects that connect youth and adults.

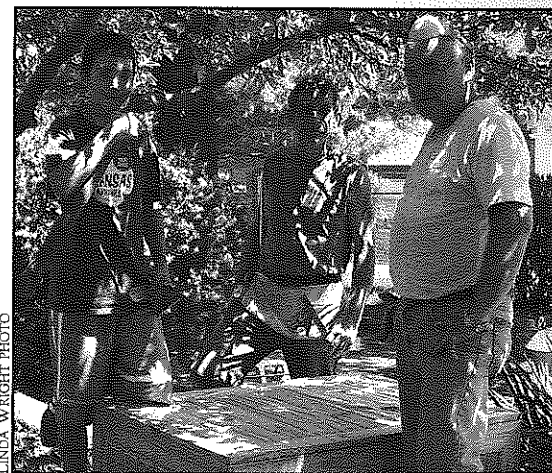
Five major projects were completed at the park, including: (1) removing two large bushes and replacing them with a Red Oak tree; (2) building a wooden box to contain the water faucet and hose; (3) installing five stone walkways in various places throughout the park; (3) constructing and installing a railroad-like balance beam and railroad crossing sign; and (5) spreading wood chips throughout the park.

Of the 60 volunteers, 35 were adults and 25 were children.

Whitmore Park, which is owned by the Sharing Community in Rosedale (a 501(c)3 organization affiliated with Rainbow Mennonite Church), is a heavily-used neighborhood park. Many people who come to the park enjoy the unique play equipment and creative design. Families, young children, and teenagers all use the park on a daily basis.

Thrivent Financial contributed \$1,000 to the project, along with several volunteers. Rainbow Mennonite contributed volunteers, as well. Several church members purchased supplies and materials beforehand and others prepared lunch on the day of the project. RDA helped coordinate and publicize.

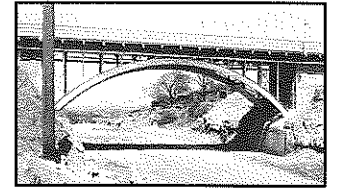

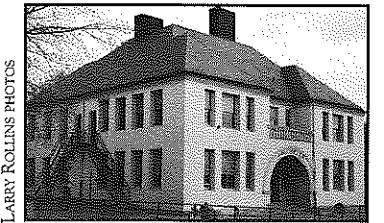
