

2008 Summer Youth Employment


This summer, for the 10th year, several ▲ local businesses partnered with RDA to provide Summer Youth Employment opportunities to local youth aged 14-16, a group that can have a difficult time finding employment due their age. The program is made possible by a grant from the Board of Public Utilities, which allows RDA to pay the youth while participating businesses provide supervision and a learning opportunity for the youth.

"The SYE program has a more immediate impact on participating youth, than any other youth program we have seen, helping them blossom into more confident and mature individuals." says Wendy Wilson, RDA Executive Director.

Immediate gratification in the form of money seems to be a great motivator of positive behavior. Along with money some great ongoing relationships have developed between the youth and their employers. Some past participants in SYE have been hired by the business after RDA's program was over. Other participants have used the experience and relationship with RDA to gain scholarships for college.

Millie applied for and participated in SYE's program for the past two years working for Betty at Vital Signs both years. This year Millie is off to college with the biggest part of her first year paid for through grants and scholarships.

To participate youth must complete an application similar to a traditional employment application and attend an interview, accompanied by a parent, in which the youth practice interviewing skills. They answer questions about their greatest strengths and challenges, why they would be a good employee, and how they performed in school this past year. More than 33 youth applied for the pro-

gram, although only 13 placements were available this year.

All youth that applied and interviewed, regardless of whether they were placed, were invited to attend four training sessions. On the first day, Dave Jones, Professor of Economics at Donnelly College, provided information on finances, such as the importance of saving money, how to use savings and checking accounts, and how taxes work.

On the second day, Linda Wright of RDA, who runs the program, taught the youth how to fill out tax forms and time sheets, as well as how to dress and act professionally. On the third day, Jennifer Stone

presented the "True Colors" training that matches personalities to colors.

The youth identified their own "color" (personality type) and learned how to recognize what "color" other people might be. Youth were taught that people of different personality colors may not always get along and how to utilize the strengths of each person to work

together as a team.

For the final day of training, a panel of community members talked about their experiences in their first jobs, provided advice for the youth, and talked about their career paths, how they became professionals in that field and answered questions. Panel members included Phaedra Dowell, a KU medical student; Susan Carr-Dowell, RN at Research Medical Center and Welborn Elementary School; Doug Lytle, owner of Olympic Cabinets and former 1984 Olympic high jump competitor; Robert Patrick, owner of Patrick Services; KCK FD Captain Steve Howard, Fire Station





osedale Congregational Church (RCC), a United Church of Christ, is celebrating its 100th Birthday this year! The church began as a small Sunday School class, meeting in a building at 43rd and Fisher. In 1908, this fledgling group formed a charter and called Rev. Leroy Halbert to be its first minister. In 1919, RCC dedicated the brick church that stands today, with its beautiful sanctuary, spacious basement and tower room office. In 1949, RCC purchased an army barracks building for its educational programs, thereby adding a nursery, kitchen and three meeting rooms. During the 1950s, the church became a focal point of the neighborhood as families worshipped together, inspired by the ministry of Rev. Oscar Bonny, a renowned speaker and dynamic leader. In 1962, RCC constructed a connection between its two buildings, thereby providing a Fellowship Hall along with two more offices.

In this 100th year of its life, the Rosedale Congregational Church is living out its call to serve God in



Rosedale through its Sunday morning worship services, its programs during the week, and its involvement in the Rosedale community. Neighborhood activities include a monthly seniors luncheon, a seniors chorus, Healthy Kids Camp, Healthy Family Meals and Vacation Bible School. Annual events include: Fish Dinner during Lent; Pet Blessing and Outdoor Worship in the spring; summer Garage Sale and Ice Cream Social; and a neighborhood Thanksgiving Dinner which has been a tradition for over fifty years. RCC has an active partnership with the

St. Paul A.M.E. Zion Church, sharing worship on occasion and coming together to plant and cultivate the Rosedale Community Garden. It also partners with the Iglesia Cristiana Interdenominacional, which worships in the church building, and with several community organizations, including RDA.

Rosedale Congregational
Church is looking ahead with
excitement to its next 100 years,
as it strives to be a place where all
are welcome, all are included, and
all are loved. In celebration of its

past, present and future, the congregation is putting on a memory-filled musical performance called "Ramblin' Rose" on Saturday, Sept. 27, 2008 at 7:00 p.m. at the church. Everyone is invited to share in this evening. Also, everyone is invited to the Centennial Worship Service on Sunday, Sept. 28, 2008 at 11:00 a.m., followed by a dinner. Along with these events will be a display of memorabilia from past decades. 


