New water fountain at Fisher Park encourages active community

Thanks to the partnership between Hilltop Neighborhood Association and Rosedale Development Association, a water fountain and a water spigot have been installed at Fisher Park.

The water fountain is a result of community members coming together to provide Rosedale kids and families with drinking water. Hilltop Neighborhood Association and RDA partnered to raise the funds for fountain installation, and the Parks and Recreation Department of the Unified Government provided the fountain itself. Funders included the Neighborhoods Rising Fund, Community Health Council of Wyandotte County and the Wyandotte County Parks Foundation.

Not only will the new water fountain help park users stay hydrated and active, but it also opens the door for another new addition to the park. A water spigot has been installed, allowing RDA to partner with the Giving Grove to plant a small fruit tree orchard in Fisher Park this spring. In 2019, the orchard will begin bearing apples, pears, and

jujubes. The trees will help to manage excess storm water that washes through the park by capturing the water and storing it in the ground.

In addition to providing water to park goers, the water fountain will provide water to volunteers during the Rozarks trails workdays.

Fisher Park has also been chosen to be part of the Healthy Parks Initiative, which invites groups of community members to start walking groups and develop projects for park beautification and improvement.

How to get involved:

- Become a fruit tree steward and learn how to care for the fruit trees
- Help maintain the Rozarks trails by attending volunteer work days at 9 a.m. on April 23 or May 28 at Fisher Park. No experience required.
- Join the Fisher Park Walking Group and be a part of making Fisher Park even better

“Zumba is for everyone,” said Adriana Rodriguez, Southwest Boulevard Family Fitness’s group instructor.

The new class, offered at 7 p.m. on Thursdays and 10 a.m. on Saturdays, is a result of Rodriguez’s determination to help the community become healthier.

When she first started as a group instructor in October 2015, Rodriguez was taking over a completely different dance class.

“It was more complicated and frustrating for me and our

members,” Rodriguez said.

In order to reach more people, Rodriguez became a certified Zumba instructor in order to help people of all skill levels reach their health goals.

“It’s even for kids,” said Rodriguez. “I see older people, people in their 20s, people wearing knee braces, mothers with their daughters, and that’s exciting for me.”

For those wanting to give Zumba a try, memberships and day passes are available. Memberships are based on income and include access

to the center’s fitness equipment and all of their classes. Day passes are also available for \$3.

Apart from Zumba, Southwest Boulevard Family Fitness also offers karate, boxing, yoga, low impact aerobics, weights, and more.



Mayor's Listening Tour Update

Wyandotte County weighs in on new income

Mayor Mark Holland's staff recently tallied results from his Listening Tour stops and found that residents of Wyandotte County want to prioritize spending of new revenue on property tax relief, park improvements, and street resurfacing.

In 2017, a new source of tax revenue from the STAR Bonds (which were used to finance the Village West development) will result in an increased revenue of approximately \$12 million per year to the Unified Government.

While Rosedale was busy weighing in on the community survey, Mayor Holland made the rounds to hear what people across Wyandotte County want to do with

this new source of sales tax revenue. The Mayor's office facilitated community conversations at one location in each of the eight districts. On average, residents attending the listening tour events said they would allocate nearly 20 percent of the new revenue to relieving property taxes, or \$2.3 million per year. Residents expressed a desire for about 10 percent to go to improving parks and 10 percent to street resurfacing. Other services included police, fire, and code enforcement.
